## One Page – Othello - Emilia Essay

'Emilia is the most admirable character in the play *Othello*.' Discuss. *Note:* You do not need to say *Emilia is perfect, just more admirable than the other characters.* 

## **Overview**

- Realistic, flawed and likeable
- Desdemona too perfect to be relatable
- Emilia rises above her status and her flaws to achieve a sort of greatness

## Points and quotes

- 1. May seem cynical but is experienced, pragmatic, intelligent, perceptive, and shrewd. Sees Othello's jealousy and warns Desdemona.
  - **Emilia to Desdemona:** [Men] are not ever jealous for the cause, / But jealous for they're jealous.'
  - Realises a 'busy and insinuating rogue' has been poisoning Othello's mind.
- 2. Kind and helpful: sympathy for Cassio. Allows him to talk to Desdemona.
  - Emilia to Cassio: 'all will sure be well.'
- 3. Loyal, brave, and loving: defends Desdemona.
  - Emilia to Othello: 'if she not be honest, chaste and true, / there's no man happy.'
- 4. Handkerchief episode shows her in a bad light, but she does not understand its significance. Misguided loyalty to lago.
  - **Emilia (about the handkerchief):** 'What he will do with it, / Heaven knows, not I. I nothing but to please his fantasy.'
  - **Emilia to Desdemona:** 'who would not make her husband a cuckold to make him a monarch?'
- 5. Spirited and courageous: confronts the armed and dangerous Othello after the murder. Redeems herself at the end of the play.
  - **Emilia to Othello:** 'Thou art rash as fire / To say she was false. O, she was heavenly true!' 'Do thy worst.'
- 6. Defies conventions because she feels duty bound to tell the truth.
  - **Emilia, on refusing to go home when ordered by lago:** 'Tis proper I obey him but not now.' 'I will speak as liberal as the north, / Let heaven, and men, and devils, let them all, / All cry shame against me, yet I'll speak.'
- 7. Emilia's passion denunciation of lago and Othello mirrors the horror and indignation of the audience.
  - **Critic A.C. Bradley** says Emilia 'sets one's teeth on edge' for much of the play but 'at the end one is ready to worship her.
